The Comprehensive Osteopathic Medical Licensing Examination (COMLEX-USA) is a licensing program for all applicants for osteopathic medical licensure in the United States. The program replaces the previous certifying examinations of the National Board of Osteopathic Medical Examiners (NBOME Part I, II, and III). The COMLEX consists of three levels. Level 1 replaced the NBOME Part I effective June 1998. The results of the COMLEX Level 1 are reported below.

PASS/FAIL Passing the COMLEX Level 1 is solely based on achieving a standard score of 400 or higher. The standard score of 400 reflects the minimum passing level recommended by the COMLEX Level 1. Individual licensing authorities may accept the COMLEX recommended pass/fail standard or may set a different passing score for their own jurisdictions.

THREE-DIGIT SCORE The three-digit score is a standard score, derived from the number of items answered correctly in the entire examination. The score scale is defined to have a mean of 500 and a standard deviation of 79. Most examinees receive a score between 200 and 800. The standard error of measurement for the standard score is within the range of 18 to 25 points.

TWO-DIGIT SCORE The two-digit score is a standard score, directly converted from a three-digit score such that 75 is designated as the minimum two-digit passing score. A two-digit score is NOT a percentile score or the percentage of items answered correctly.

The program replaces the previous certifying examinations of the National Board of Osteopathic Medical Examiners (NBOME Part I, II, and III). The COMLEX consists of three levels. Level 2-CE (Cognitive Evaluation) replaced the NBOME Part II effective March 1997. The results of the COMLEX Level 2-CE are reported below.

PASS/FAIL Passing the COMLEX Level 2-CE is solely based on achieving a standard score of 400 or higher. The standard score of 400 reflects the minimum passing level recommended by the COMLEX Level 2-CE. Individual licensing authorities may accept the COMLEX recommended pass/fail standard or may set a different passing score for their own jurisdictions.

THREE-DIGIT SCORE The three-digit score is a standard score, derived from the number of items answered correctly in the entire examination. The three-digit score scale is defined to have a mean of 500 and a standard deviation of 83. Most examinees receive a score between 250 and 750. The standard error of measurement for the three-digit score is within the range of 22 to 26 points.

TWO-DIGIT SCORE The two-digit score is a standard score, directly converted from a three-digit score such that 75 is designated as the minimum two-digit passing score. A two-digit score is NOT a percentile score or the percentage of items answered correctly.

The Biomedical/Biomechanical Domain measures skills in Data-Gathering, osteopathic manipulative treatment, and written SOAP Notes. The Data-Gathering component reflects skills in history-taking and physical examination. The OMT portion represents performance of osteopathic assessment and manipulative treatment in select cases. The written SOAP Note measures written communication (synthesizing information gathered in the clinical encounter), clinical problem-solving, integrated differential diagnosis and formulation of a therapeutic plan. Osteopathic principles are incorporated into each of the three areas. Doctor-patient communication, interpersonal skills, and professionalism are measured as part of the Humanistic Domain.

Level 3 replaced the NBOME Part III effective February 1995. The results of the COMLEX Level 3 are reported below.

PASS/FAIL Passing the COMLEX Level 3 is solely based on achieving a standard score of 350 or higher. The standard score of 350 reflects the minimum passing level recommended by the COMLEX Level 3. Individual licensing authorities may accept the COMLEX recommended pass/fail standard or may set a different passing score for their own jurisdictions.

THREE-DIGIT SCORE The three-digit score is a standard score, derived from the number of items answered correctly in the entire examination. The score scale is defined to have a mean of 500 and a standard deviation of 121. Most examinees receive a score between 200 and 800. The standard error of measurement for the standard score is within the range of 43 to 47 points.

TWO-DIGIT SCORE The two-digit score is a standard score, directly converted from a three-digit score such that 75 is designated as the minimum two-digit passing score. A two-digit score is NOT a percentile score or the percentage of items answered correctly.
